WHEREAS, the members of this General Assembly were greatly saddened to learn of the passing of Donald Louis Wamp, Sr.; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Wamp was an exemplary public servant, consummate professional, and true Southern gentleman who worked assiduously to improve the quality of life for his fellow citizens in numerous capacities; and

WHEREAS, the son of a carpenter and homebuilder, Don Wamp was born and raised in Cullman, Alabama, graduating from Cullman High School and earning his bachelor's degree from Auburn University's school of architecture, where he served as the ROTC Cadet Commander, played saxophone in the marching band, and was a proud member of Lambda Chi Alpha; and

WHEREAS, after completing basic training as a commissioned officer, Mr. Wamp met and married the love of his life, Mary Beth Meadows Wamp, and began serving his country with the dedication and conviction of a true patriot as a pilot in the United States Army; and

WHEREAS, rising from his humble beginnings, Mr. Wamp eventually became one of the most prominent architects in the South in a career that would span a half a century and result in the design of over 1,000 commercial, residential, and industrial businesses in the Chattanooga area alone; and

WHEREAS, he also masterfully designed numerous schools across Tennessee, always producing plans that were practical, efficient, and expertly directed toward meeting the needs of the teachers and students; and

WHEREAS, in addition to being a industrious businessman and brilliant architect, Mr. Wamp was an active and important member of his community and profession, having co-founded the United Bank of Chattanooga and served as the Commissioner of Recreation for the city of East Ridge, a Captain in the Army National Guard, and both the local and state president of the American Institute of Architects; and

WHEREAS, known for his sportsmanlike conduct both on and off the court, Don Wamp was an avid tennis player who captured a plethora of local and state titles; and

WHEREAS, a devout Christian, Mr. Wamp was a man of deep and abiding faith whose godly character was evident to all who were fortunate enough to know him; and

WHEREAS, this remarkable man was also deeply devoted to his family, and he always endeavored to remain true to family values of the highest order; and

WHEREAS, it is fitting that this General Assembly should pause to remember the bountiful life of this exceptional public servant and human being; now, therefore,




