AN ACT to amend Chapter 50 of the Private Acts of 1979; and any other acts amendatory thereto, relative to the Charter for the town of Troy.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Chapter 50 of the Private Acts of 1979, and any other acts amendatory thereto, is amended by deleting Chapter 3, Section 5 in its entirety and substituting instead the following:

Section 5. Board action and meeting time. Three (3) alderman and the mayor shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business of the board. The board of mayor and alderman shall meet in regular session one (1) time each month and shall also meet upon the call of the mayor made in writing and served upon each member of the board of alderman or by resolution of the board. If any member of the board of aldermen should be absent from the town, service of notice of extra or called meetings upon three (3) members of the board shall be sufficient. A majority vote of the board of aldermen present shall be necessary for passage of ordinances, resolutions and motions.

SECTION 2. This act shall have no effect unless it is approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the legislative body. Its approval or nonapproval shall be proclaimed by the presiding officer of the legislative body of the town of Troy and certified to the secretary of state.


SECTION 3. For the purpose of approving or rejecting the provisions of this act, it shall be effective upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it. For all other purposes, it shall become effective as provided in Section 2.
