Spain Jamison Is Found Dead






OBITUARY.

DIED on the 7th April, 1841, in Williamson County, MR. WILLIAM THOMAS. The deceased was born 10th of July, 1772, in Nottoway County, Virginia—he emigrated to Nashville in 1796, and settled in Williamson County, February 1808, on the place where he resided till the time of his death. He was a worthy and highly respected citizen—his talents were about mediocrity, and though he never acted in public life, yet by his many virtues and high moral worth, he won for himself numerous friends, whose attachment through life and deep anxiety and attention during his last illness, kindly evidenced their warm and sincere respect and friendship for him. In his intercourse with men, honesty, and integrity, with punctuality, was ever his motto, and no man perhaps ever observed more strict uprightiness and probity in all his transactions, and though possessed in some degree of an irritable disposition, yet by the action of sound judgment and vigorous energy of mind, he always so governed it as to avoid giving offence to any. As a neighbor he was kind and sociable—as a parent he was firm and affectionate, and felt great anxiety that his family should sacredly preserve that high moral character—the example of which he had set before them, and over which he ever watched with unceasing vigilance. As a husband he was tender and affectionate, and it may here be remarked as a singular coincidence, that he was interred on the very day of the 31st anniversary of his marriage.

The deceased professed religion, which greatly added to the moral strength and influence of his example. He united with the Baptist Church of Christ at Big Harpeth, in May, 1814, of which he ever remained a worthy member for 26 years, performing all the various duties of a member, and if not the most active, was yet among the most constant in his attendance in the Church, and on divine worship. He shewed by his conduct great anxiety for the prosperity of the Church, and the salvation of sinners. It might truly be said of him, in the language of the Saviour, 'No man lighteth a candle and putteth it under a bushel or under the bed, but setteth it in a candle stick, that it may give light to all in the house.' He ever lived a consistent predestinarian Baptist, and amidst all the changes and inventions of men, continued steadfast in the principles of the Gospel, 'earnestly contending for the faith once delivered the saints.' As in his life, so in his death: during his last illness, which was long and severe, he bore it with fortitude, and more than ordinary resignation; but a few days before his departure, while exhorting his family, he entreated those professing religion, to live worthy of their profession, and to 'live the life of the righteous, that they might die the death thereof.' To those making no profession he spoke of the great necessity of having an humble confidence in Jesus, for in the most trying hour, or situated as he was, that it was 'more precious than gold, yea, than fine gold.' He complained of being but an unprofitable servant, and prayed earnestly and fervently for more grace, and for a perfect resignation to the will of God; adding 'I know I shall give a worse state for a better.' In the death of Mr. Thomas, society has lost a worthy member, the Church one of her brightest ornaments, the family a faithful and ardent friend, and has left a numerous circle of friends and acquaintances, with a large and respectable family to mourn their loss; but we believe their loss to be his gain.
