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INTRODUCTION

The Inquirers' Club, Nashville, Tennessee, Records, 1911-1961, have been placed on deposit in the Tennessee State Library and Archives by the Inquirers' Club, a literary club of Nashville, Tennessee.

The materials in this finding aid measure 1.68 linear feet. There are no restrictions on the materials. Single photocopies of unpublished writings in the Inquirer's Club Papers may be made for purposes of scholarly research.

SCOPE AND CONTENT

The records of the Inquirers' Club, a literary club primarily dealing with religious subjects, containing approximately 300 items and 15 volumes, are composed of minutes, 1911-1961; treasurer's books, 1911-1920, 1939-1961; a scrapbook of the Rev. J.W. Cherry's sermonettes; resolutions; programs; constitution and bylaws; a history of the Inquirers from 1911-1953; quotations from Mr. Cherry's lectures; membership lists; and forty-eight yearbooks, 1913-1961.

This club was founded May 6, 1911, by the Rev. J.W. Cherry and was disbanded in 1961. The club's programs dealt mainly with religious subjects, with a few about history, poetry, biographical studies, philosophy, and others. Included in the papers is a brief biographical sketch of the founder, the Rev. J.W. Cherry. The minutes are complete from 1911-1961 and the yearbooks are from 1913-1961.

The records were placed on deposit in the Tennessee State Library and Archives by Mrs. Archer Beasley, Nashville, Tennessee, a member of the club.
